Owners: Monty & Verdi Abdullah-Montgomery

Location: On Sierra College Blvd.

Between King Rd. and Taylor Rd., Loomis

2 Quilt Name: Lonestar Owners: Ken and Barbara Mackey

Location: 6731 Horseshoe Bar Rd., Loomis

Quilt Name: X Mark's the Box Owners: Jim & Jan Struble Location: Struble Ranch

Can be seen at the corner of Dick Cook Rd. & Hansen Rd., Loomis

This quilt pattern represents the wooden packing boxes marked with a blue and white X on the end, which identified them as belonging to the Struble Ranch. Wooden boxes were used when picked fruit was taken into the Loomis fruit packing houses in the 1940's.

This barn quilt depicts the citrus grown at the ranch, from the flowering bud, protective leaves, to the final mandarin orange ready for harvest.

Three restored caterpillar tractors are at the ranch, and this pattern honors the three generations of the Struble family who have farmed here.



Quilt Name: Four T's

This barn quilt honors four generations of Tudsburys on the same land since 1911. Steve, Elinor and Elinor's sister, Jacque Sady, each live on 10 acres of the orginal 80 acres which was owned by their great granfather, W. H. Tudsbury.



8 Quilt Name: Mandarin Fruit Basket Owners: Todd & Janet Nelson

Location: 3945 El Monte Drive, Loomis

This fruit basket pattern was chosen to feature the original Poirier families mandarin fruit packing shed built in 1946. The racing banner border represents the families passion for race cars and motorcycles. They also have been involved in the 4-H community for many years, thus the corner 4-H symbol. Their property is a registered historic landmark known as "Rock House Ranch".
